


England at the beginning of the 11th Century


- Relative peace from the middle of the 10th century
- Aethelred II succeeded to the throne in 978
- Viking raids start up again
- Agreement with Richard I of Normandy
- Tension between ex-Danelaw parts of England and rest of England
- St Brice's Day Massacre 1002





The Danish Invasion 1013-1015


- Sweyn Forkbeard leads full-scale invasion of England
- Aethelred flees to Normandy with his family
- Sweyn confirmed as King of England but dies in early 1014
- Cnut supported by Danelaw but Council call back Aethelred
- Aethelred gathers an army and drives Cnut back to Denmark
- In early 1015, Aethelred returns to his old ways
- Cnut invades Wessex
- Aethelred falls ill
- Edric switches sides to follow Cnut
- By end of 1015 Cnut in control of large parts of the country

















Aftermath

- England divided once again
- Edmund died on 30th November 1016 so Cnut becomes king of all England
- Cnut ruled wisely and married Emma of Normandy
- 1020 Cnut has minster church dedicated to those killed in the battle



Long Term Effects

- England and Normandy are now closely tied together
- Harald Hardrada claims Cnut's empire in England
- Would William of Normandy have had a claim to the throne of England if Edmund had continued as King?
- Would Harold have been defeated at Hastings if he hadn't first had to rush north to fight off Hardrada?
